

On community involvement

I have always had a passion for community service. In college, I was a member of Alpha Phi Omega, a national co-ed community service fraternity. Currently, I am active in my local church and assist with the Sunday school program. In addition, I am an officer of a local networking group, Your Executive Round Table (YERT), whose mission is to help members of our community through monthly charitable events.

One of my passions is to assist other women in meeting their professional goals. In furtherance of that passion, I sit on the executive board of the National Association of Women Business Owners (NAWBO) as board secretary. I am also the co-chair of the Membership Committee. The Greater Philadelphia Chapter of NAWBO is the seventh largest chapter in the country. The organization's mission is to advance the interests of women entrepreneurs.

On professional accomplishment

Early in my career, I was practicing family law and one of my cases involved representing a mother in an international custody dispute to a non-Hague nation. The case went to trial, and it was the first case that I tried solo. I won the trial and the case was appealed.

Ultimately the case landed in the NJ Supreme Court. By the time the case was argued in the NJ Supreme Court, I had started working at my current firm. The client followed me. I explained to the partners of my firm that I wanted to see this matter through, so the firm agreed to allow me to continue the representation. By the time I argued before the NJ Supreme Court, I was seven months pregnant. The New Jersey Supreme Court affirmed in a published opinion making new law in New Jersey.

I learned a tremendous amount from my client that still resonates with me today. Most importantly, I learned faith through perseverance. My client's faith in the outcome of the case never wavered. I also learned that every experience is going to shape you.

On leadership

I have found the age-old things that my mother taught me as a child to be the most invaluable lessons and the ones that have steered my leadership style. Two come to mind: 1. Lead by example and 2. Teamwork - that "all for one and one for all" attitude.

Too often, I have seen leaders act hypocritically – applying the “do as I say not as I do” attitude. I have not found that to be successful. I train all of my people to lead and succeed – in whatever their endeavor. I am not threatened by their success. Rather I am grateful that I may have played some small part in that achievement.

I also believe that if there is a job to do, I am not above rolling up my sleeves to get the job done.

Something that others might not know

Most people do not know that I am first generation American. My parents emigrated here from Europe in the 1950s, and my brother, sister and I are the first generation to go to college. I am proud of that fact.

My faith, my family and my children motivate and inspire me to be the best person I can be every day.
